

Learning lifelong lessons at Pioneer Bike Club

Some things in life are never forgotten. When it comes to a seat, handlebars, pedals, two wheels and a chain, a sense of balance and momentum -- a childlike wonder transitions into adult fascination, ubiquitous with longevity. After all, anything can be like riding a bike. Especially the exact thing.

Just ask the peppy group of 3rd through 5th graders at Pioneer Elementary School, who soon this spring, will spend several afternoons a week riding the trails, bumps and curves of Cedar Lanes Bike Park. It's all part of the City of Auburn's Pioneer Bike Club, an after-school program meant to not only give kids something to do after school, but also teach them how to ride. And how to ride well.

"It means happiness," said 8-year-old Obed, who minutes earlier was winding his way down a tricky s-curve

The program is funded through a King County Youth Sport Grant. The KCYSPG supports additional free bike programming at Cedar Lanes including: Summer Ride program, REC Riders, Pedal Power Learn-to-Ride program for the Auburn School District ECEAP Preschool and Transitional Kindergarten and community events.

Cedar Lanes Park – tucked away in South Auburn behind homes and aptly named elementary school – is a unique combination of native woodland, well-kept lawn, and lively playground. Dominating the landscape for many months, a multi-phase, under-construction bike park, set to be finished in the spring.

The bike park includes a new bike skills park, constructed by the City of Auburn in partnership with Evergreen Mountain Bike Alliance. The clever system of trails and skills courses blend masterfully with the bushy green and dense foliage. If you didn't know what it was, you'd assume it had always been there.

Phase one was completed last summer, with phase two – the pump track set to open in April. And then, a new restroom facility and picnic shelter later this summer.

At this time, Bike Club is open Pioneer Elementary School students only. Online sign up information is provided to 3rd-5th grade teachers to share with their students. Enrollment is on a first come, first served basis. Check out the rest of the Bike Program lineup this Spring at auburnwa.gov/bike

Along the same time as the park's new bike course, the City of Auburn premiered the Pioneer Bike Club, featuring about 40 kids from Pioneer Elementary. Staff meet with kids at school and then walk them to the park each day of the program. All participants are given a journal and record how they feel that day, what goals they want to work on, and how they might get there.

And then from about 3:15 to 5:15 p.m., they can be found out and about mastering the curves.

Many of the kids had never ridden a bike before, especially not on dirt trails.

"Most of the kids were not great riders," said Recreation Coordinator Kjerstin Lange, who manages the program. "And as you can see, they are now easily circling the trails." She continues, "Getting kids active in the park is great; especially for those who are learning to ride a bike for the first time. But that's not all that Bike Club is about. It builds confidence in kids and empowers them to try new things. It gives them a community outside of their family and their school where they belong. And it lets them just be kids!"

The program is set to pick back up in spring, with additional courses this summer, meant for kids two and a half to 17. They'll teach bike safety, how to ride, and how to master everything in-between.

For Lori Hawkins, mother of spry 9-year-old Connor who just "loves riding bikes," the program makes sense – help parents get their kids' energy out after school? And teach them a lifelong skill? Something this sensible is hardly forgotten.

"I love it," she said, turning her head to glimpse the passing of neon green helmets half a football field away. "He can come here and just ride."

Bike programs will be available to the entire Auburn Community this spring and summer. Join Auburn Parks as the Pump Track officially opens on Saturday, May 11 from 10 a.m.-noon. Coaches will be available for instruction. bikes and helmets will be available for check out, vendors and more! Check out Summer Ride- a free drop-in program held in partnership with Cycle Therapy Racing, July 9th-Aug. 16 on



Tuesdays and Thursdays from 5-8 p.m. Summer Ride will offer a free 30-minute skills workshop and open riding in the park with coaches on

hand to offer instruction. Bikes and helmets will be available for check out with the completion of a waiver. For the full program lineup visit auburnwa.gov/bike

Including Diverse Voices at the White River Valley Museum


he White River Valley Museum was recently chosen as one of 24 museums in the nation to attend the Racial Justice and Museums Convening developed by the Smithsonian Institute and held in Minnesota in April 2024. The White River Valley Museum features the diverse and interesting histories of Auburn through exhibits and public programs.





Racial History of Auburn Tours

These tours center around the diverse history of Indigenous peoples, immigrants, and colonist settlers in the Valley. The Museum explores topics like Japanese incarceration during WWII, the formation of Indian reservations, redlining, and racist labor union practices on a hyper-local level – using primary documents, maps, and photos from the Museum's collection. Since beginning these tours in 2021 the Museum has toured all City of Auburn employees and much of the Auburn Police Department. The tours continue now for outside agencies and businesses and is offered as a public program throughout the year.





Black in the Valley Online Exhibit

Is there Black History in Auburn? Yes, yes there is. Black settlers came into the region as early as 1870 working alongside immigrant laborers in hops and potato fields. Black Americans in the region did not have it easy; they were exploited as scabs in the railroad industry, pushed out of the housing market by redlining, and forced to live amongst the Ku Klux Klan. Sea to Stream Field Trip Program

Every fall the Museum tours over 2000 students at the Mary Olson Farm. On Sea to Stream field trips students learn about salmon and conduct field science alongside trained naturalists from the Environmental Science Center. This program moves outside of typical STEM by incorporating Native voices and traditional ways of knowing. Students learn about Native fishing practices, the gifts of native plants, and get to sample traditional nettle tea and make nettle cordage. These field trips are offered free of charge thanks to funds raised at the Museum's annual gala and funding provided by 4Culture and the King Conservation District.



Where Castoffs Go to Heal and Grow: The Art of Marita Dingus on exhibit through May 26, 2024

The Museum partnered with nationally recognized artist and Auburn native Marita Dingus for their current exhibit. The exhibit features 40 pieces spanning Dingus's career. These sculptures fill the Museum's gallery space reflecting both the indoor and outdoor experiences of visiting Dingus's family home, now turned artist's studio in Auburn. Dingus's art is also displayed in the Museum's permanent exhibits inviting visitors to contemplate what it means to see black faces in historic spaces where they have traditionally been excluded. Conversely guests can ponder what histories the Black community shares with the historic people they are placed beside.







Dancing with our Ancestors on exhibit June 19 - Oct. 13, 2024

The Japanese community has played a large role in the history of our region and their culture is woven into the fabric of the Valley today. One of the largest cultural celebrations for the local Buddhist community is Obon, or just Bon for short. This festival celebrates the deceased and is a way for participants to connect with their ancestors through dance. This summer the Museum will feature a new exhibit in partnership with the White River Buddhist Temple that explores the food, fashion, and dances of Obon right here in Auburn.

Downtown Auburn Revitalization Efforts Main Street Infrastructure and Auburn Avenue Theater Reconstruction

Over the course of the next few years, the City of Auburn will continue efforts to re-vitalize Downtown Auburn with the Downtown Infrastructure Improvements Project.

This project will replace **infrastructure on Auburn Avenue** and East Main Street that is at or near the end of its useful service life, make streetscape improvements that help create a welcoming environment, and start the planning and design process to replace the **Auburn Avenue Theater**. Replaced infrastructure includes water, sewer, and storm utilities, roadway pavement, and sidewalks on East Main Street from Auburn Avenue to B Street SE (B Street Plaza) and on Auburn Avenue from 1st Street NE to East Main Street. The project will also replace the traffic signal at East Main Street/Auburn Avenue.

The existing Theater was structurally damaged at the end of 2021 and subsequently condemned in January 2022. The damage was due to the demolition of an adjacent building, which was the result of a fire in July 2021 that destroyed the apartment building and several businesses. Significant structural issues have resulted in the decision to demolish the existing Auburn Avenue Theater and rebuild a new Theater.

In fall of 2023, as part of the overall downtown infrastructure project, Auburn requested proposals for design services from qualified consultant firms. After a thorough review and evaluation of the proposals Otak Inc. was selected to provide architectural and engineering design services for delivering this project.

Business Impacts:

Auburn is committed to limiting inconveniences and impacts to residents and local businesses because of construction. During construction, access to downtown businesses will be maintained.

Auburn Avenue Theater Project Components:

- Theater Demolition: The City is preparing a separate contract to demolish the existing Theater. Demolition likely occurs in the spring of 2024.
- 2. **Theater Redesign:** Otak will advance the City's current conceptual design to a preliminary design document for a new 290-310 seat (up to 10,300 SF) performing arts theater. This will allow the design team to develop an opinion of probable construction costs for future budget planning purposes.
- 3. **New Theater Construction:** Full design and construction costs to rebuild the Auburn Avenue Theater is not secured or part of this current project; however the City will continue to seek additional funding sources as this project progresses.

Downtown Infrastructure Components:

 Utility work includes approx. 600 LF of new sanitary sewer, 500 LF of new water main, 150 LF of underground overhead power and communications facilities, replaced traffic signal, 3300 SY of full roadway, sidewalk, and plaza areas, pedestrian scale decorative street lighting, downtown standard street lighting, and an enhanced pedestrian crossing.

Timeline:

- Infrastructure Design Completion: Fall 2024
- Infrastructure Construction: Winter 2024/2025-Summer 2025



Brewing Community: The Heartfelt Journey of Z Street Coffee Roasters

or Jeff and Diane Pechacek, the journey of Z Street Coffee Roasters is a tale of love, family, and the pursuit of excellence in every cup. With over a decade of experience under their belt, this dynamic duo has mastered the art of custom coffee roasting, catering to each customer's unique preferences with precision and care.

What began as a humble countertop roaster in the cozy home of Jeff and Diane has blossomed into a beloved local business, fueled by passion, dedication, and a deep-rooted commitment to serving others. Their story is one of grassroots growth and unwavering community support. From experimenting with roasting techniques in their kitchen, to proudly showcasing their craft at the Auburn Farmers Market since 2016, Jeff and Diane have remained steadfast in their mission to provide a local, artisanal alternative to mass-produced coffee.

"Coffee is a challenging business to be in because the 'hard core' bigger companies have a huge loyalty" Jeff explains "We create custom orders, people can pick the bean, the roast and the grind."

From garage to market

Roasting coffee beans at home was purely a fun hobby. Jeff & Diane had always enjoyed making things from scratch so, why not coffee? Fun soon turned into gift giving for the holidays. Before long a full-time job and a new business was underway. Starting a business was no easy feat. Lots of trial and error, research, Auburn incubator classes, and help from Green River College. Searching for the right roaster, then a bigger roaster to meet demands,

led to Farmers Markets to spread the word about their unique product. And then eventually moving online to make custom orders for people all over the country.

After success at the Auburn Farmers Market, Jeff & Diane branched out to other local Farmers Markets including Maple Valley and Enumclaw. Not only are they the best custom coffee around, they are also wonderful vendors everywhere they go. They strongly believe that word of mouth is the best way to spread their message and share their positivity and coffee with the community.





You'll see them regularly at local Farmers Markets, giving out samples, talking with customers and referring to other vendors in the area. They actively support their neighboring businesses and thrive off sharing the wealth. They've experienced firsthand the power of people and kindness. They love overhearing comments from passersby, regardless if they make a purchase or not. "Those are the people with the coffee", "Remember them, that was really good coffee" Or another favorite "I was told I should come see you." Z Street is quick to return the compliment to other businesses. They don't see other vendors as competition. They believe we're all in this together and the best way to be successful is to support each other.

Beyond the pursuit of business success, the heart of Z Street Coffee Roasters lies in their unwavering commitment to giving back – for no other reason than it's just the right thing to do.

Back in February 2023, Auburn's Senior Center Manager Radine Lozier was notified that Catholic Community Services – the center's longtime lunch provider – would no longer provide coffee as part their program. That meant for the first time in over 45 years, at a place where seniors have come to gather for lunch and converse over something warm, coffee wouldn't be part of the picture.

When do we start? We'll provide our top shelf stuff. We might even join the group from time to time, as both my wife and I are over 60." Jeff started delivering fresh roasted beans once a week for the lunch program and the seniors love it!

There was no hesitation about providing for the lunch program, Jeff responded with "Absolutely, seniors need a good cup of coffee too!"

The Senior Center also has a coffee bar in the lobby. For the last 20 plus years, coffee had been purchased from a well-known commercial hospitality company. Coffee was delivered every other month by the case. Lozier noticed that the cost had been increasing rapidly since Covid. She reached out to Jeff for a quote on Z Street Coffee for the Coffee Bar. Their price for weekly delivered locally roasted coffee was substantially less. The Senior Center began purchasing Z Street Coffee in January 2024. It is a hit. Participants love the fresh taste and the fact that it is roasted locally. Jeff is getting to know the seniors as he comes in weekly. Tommy Swanlund, coffee bar volunteer, and Jeff have developed a great relationship.

Radine states, "We are grateful to Jeff and Diane for answering our email and working with us to provide local, fresh roasted coffee at a reasonable price."

A giving heart

Jeff & Diane's dedication to community outreach is matched only by their passion for the perfect roast. With each batch carefully curated to meet the individual tastes of their customers, Z Street Coffee Roasters stands apart as a beacon of quality and customization in an industry dominated by mass production.

As they look towards the future, Jeff and Diane remain driven by their shared vision of spreading joy, one cup of coffee at a time. With plans to expand their reach through wholesale accounts and larger customer bases, they remain committed to upholding the values of integrity, compassion, and top-tier customer service that have guided them from the very beginning.

In a world where coffee culture often feels impersonal and industrialized, Z Street Coffee Roasters serves as a refreshing reminder of the power of passion, community, and a really good cup of coffee. each month from 6:30-8pm, including monthly featured readers followed by an open mic opportunity for those wishing to share their creativity with the audience.


Soon there will be even more opportunities to go to the Postmark for community arts programs! The City of Auburn



2024 Utility Discount & Rebate Program



The City of Auburn offers reduced utility rates or rebates to seniors 62 years of age or older whose annual income level does not exceed the amount allowed for very low income as defined by the Department of Housing & Urban Income Limits. Before You Commute: Bike Safety Tips from VRFA

Bicycles are increasingly being used to commute to work or school, for exercise, or simply for leisure. While cycling is a convenient mode of transportation, it comes with risk. The two bike-related accidents we see most often are falls and collisions with vehicles. You can prevent injuries and minimize the risk of collisions by taking a few precautions.

It is important to know the rules of the road before riding your bike. Ride with traffic and stay as far to the right as possible. Make sure to use the appropriate hand signals, obey traffic lights, come to a complete stop at all stop signs and stoplights, remain alert, and watch for cars and trucks.

It is also important that your bike fits you. It is much harder to control a bike that is too big for you. Your feet should touch the ground when you are sitting on the seat. Check to make sure everything is working properly, including brakes and gears. Be sure tires are tightly secured and properly inflated. Avoid wearing long or loose-fitting clothing that can get caught in chains or wheel spokes. Most importantly, always wear a properly fitted bike helmet to protect your head in case of a fall.

A helmet should sit on the top of the head in a level position. It should not rock forward, backward, or side to side. The



rim of the helmet should be one to two finger lengths above the eyebrows. The helmet straps should form a "V" under your ears, with the bottom of the "V" just below the earlobe. The helmet straps must always be buckled when riding and should be snug and comfortable. Open your mouth as wide as possible; if the helmet doesn't feel snug on your head, tighten the straps, and ensure the buckle is flat against your skin.


